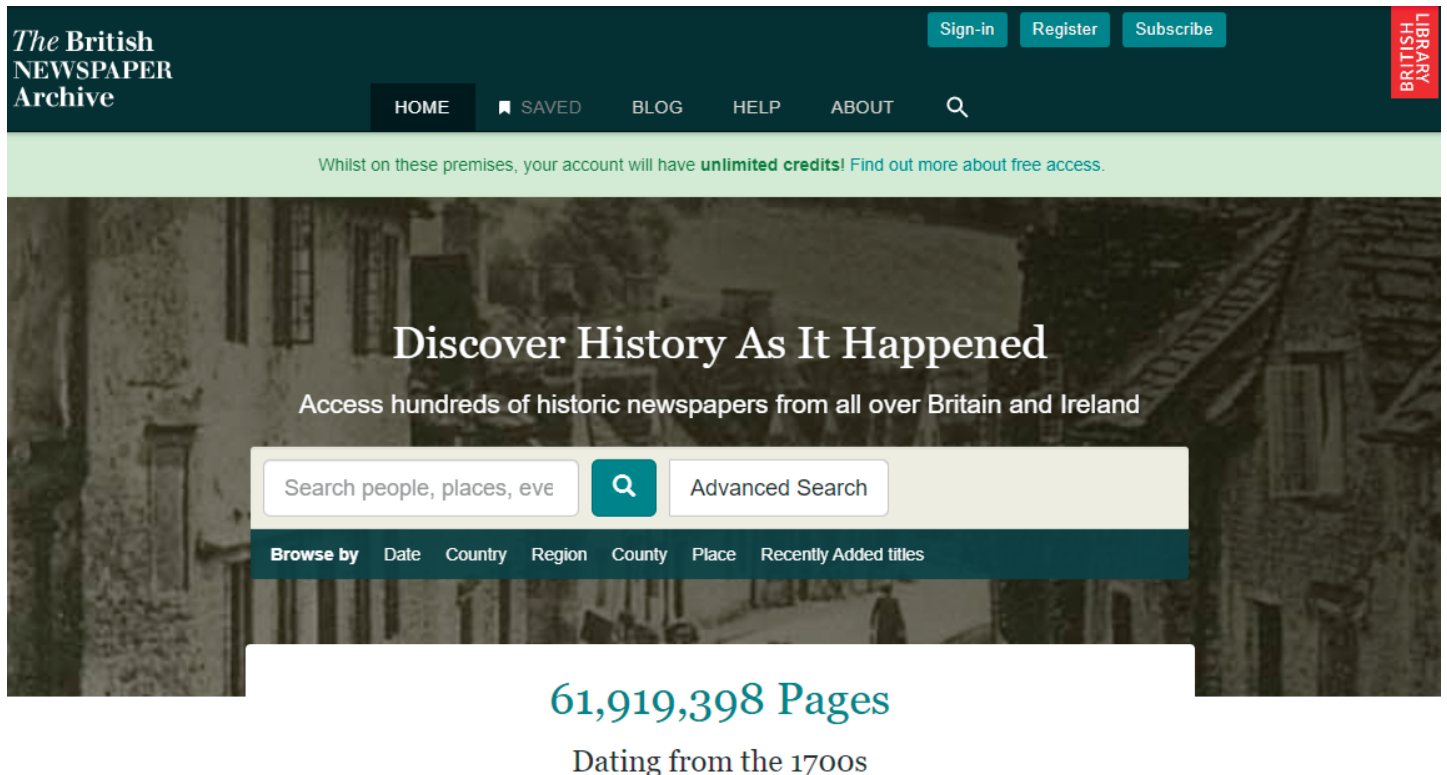

Access The British Newspaper Archive for free in the Barossa Library's Local History room, on public access computer LH10.

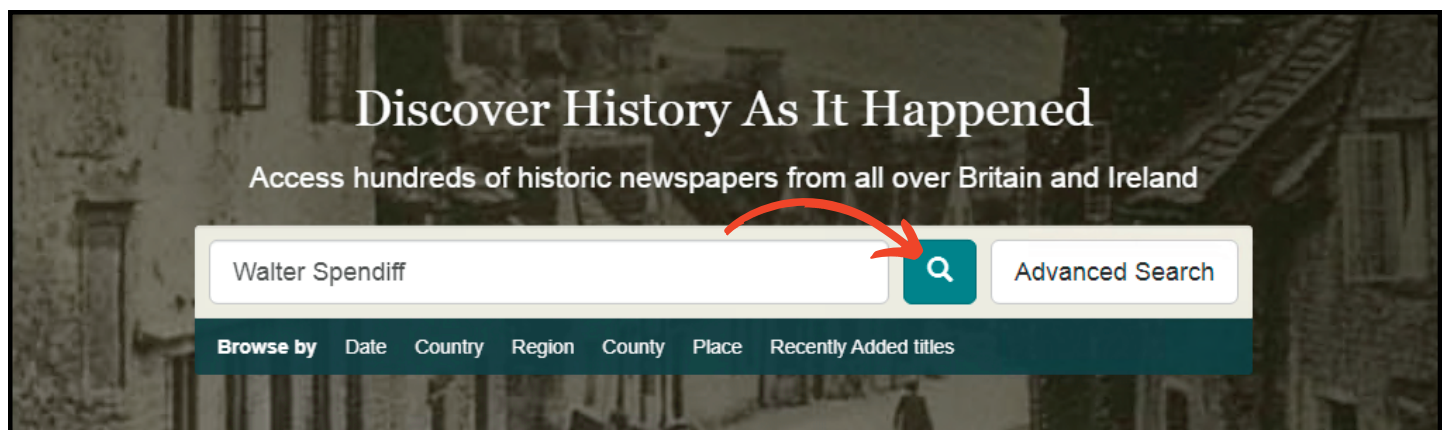
Trace your family history by searching hundreds of historic newspapers from all over Britain and Ireland. Please note you will need to register (for free) and sign in before being able to view articles.

BASIC SEARCH

Enter your ancestor's name, place name or event and click on the magnifying glass to get started.

BASIC SEARCH CONTINUED

You can refine by date, newspaper, countries, regions and more. Click on the title to view the article. Save searches by clicking on the blue 'Save This Search' button. Note you will need to register or sign in before able to view. Once open you can save or print the article of interest.
